Tap water in the EU is clean







Current Drinking Water Directive (1998)

- Objective: to protect human health from adverse effects of any contamination of water intended for human consumption
 - monitoring and testing 48 parameters*
 - information to consumers
 - reporting to COM
- Applies to distribution systems serving >50 people or supplying > 10 cubic meters/day



Why the need for change?

2014

- European Citizens Initiative Right2Water
- Follow-up: Public consultation on drinking water
 - → But also: drinking water crisis in Flint, Michigan

REFIT Evaluation Drinking Water Directive

2017

- Cooperation with WHO: recommendations
- Impact Assessment Study and Staff Working Document




